Project Summary

The All Stars Center for Youth Development will be a new hip, urban, seven-day-a-week, 14-hour a day hub for the All Stars projects. To be located in Manhattan, it will serve as the headquarters of:

*The All Stars Talent Show Network, one of the country's most successful antiviolence, pro-development programs for inner city youth. The All Stars Talent Show Network uses performance as an effective tool to help young people achieve the moral and social gains they need to make it and contribute positively to today's society;

*The Castillo Theatre, which has created New York City community theater — perhaps the only community theater in New York City — for the past 16 years. Castillo's multi-cultural, developmental theater is designed for and attracts audiences who represent the full diversity that is New York City;

*The Development School for Youth, a leadership training and career education program for high school students;

*The Fred Newman Scholarship Program that provides support and training to social service professionals working on the "front lines" in inner city communities.

The All Stars Center's planned 22,000 square foot facility will feature a multimedia welcome center and exhibition space; a 199+-seat theater and performance space with set shop, costume shop, dressing rooms, green room, production offices, lobby and café; an All Stars youth "clubhouse"; All Stars executive offices; a volunteer center featuring a 40-station telemarketing area for fund-raising and outreach, computers and workstations.

All Stars Talent Show Network

The All Stars Talent Show Network, our youth anti-violence program is now in its 18th year. Widely regarded as the most successful anti-violence program in America, it touches the lives of 25,000 inner city youth every year. Each year, under the direction of national producer Pam Lewis, the All Stars produces over 40 events in all of the boroughs of New York City, as well as in New Jersey and Atlanta, Georgia. In each community, All Stars produces an audition, volunteer meeting, development workshop and talent show over the course of a month. Young people are trained in running lights, sound, stage-managing, security, ticket sales and outreach and as performers.

There has been a significant drop in crime and violence in neighborhoods where the All Stars has had a highly visible presence, e.g. in the last three years, 12,500 young people in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn have participated in 25 All Stars events. In that same time period there has been a 22% decrease in crime.

For All Stars youth, the program has meant a stable support network during an important period in their lives. Sha'worne Smith, 21, has participated since she was 11 years old. Now a full-time college student with a part-time job, she continues to perform and also manages two dance groups. She says, "You never know what's going to happen with school and work, but the All Stars is always there."

The All Stars has been welcomed by parents and the community. It gives them new resources that reinforce the sense of responsibility, pride and accomplishment that they want to give to their children.

Highlights:

- The All Stars Talent Show Network co-produced with the Castillo Theatre Crown Heights, a musical "healing" play in which black and Jewish youth came together, on stage and off, to participate in a three-month creative theatrical process in which they explored the unresolved moral and ethical issues raised by tragic events that took place between their communities in Crown Heights, Brooklyn in 1991. Crown Heights was a feature piece on NY1's Community Events.
- The All Stars is a member of the Newark Youth Anti-Violence Task Force in New Jersey.
- WNBC-TV featured the All Stars Talent Show Network on its weekly public affairs program, Four Stories.



Regional

- The All Stars Talent Show Network began partnering with the Newark Boys' and Girls' Club to bring developmental programs to the young people of Newark.
- A New Jersey Committee for Youth Development has been formed to promote this important resource for New Jersey's youth.

National

• A community-based, community-funded All Stars Talent Show Network program was launched in Atlanta in October 1998.

International

- In April 1998, youth from the All Stars Talent Show Network represented the United States at a drug abuse prevention forum in Banff, Alberta (Canada), sponsored by the United Nations International Drug Control Program.
- In January 1999, youth from the All Stars Talent Show Network led workshops on creating peace in communities for UNICEF at the 19th World Scout Jamboree in Chile (South America).



The Development School for Youth

Launched in the spring of 1997, The Development School for Youth is a leadership-training program for young people between the ages of 16 and 21. The 12-week program is produced and directed by Dr. Lenora Fulani, the distinguished community activist and developmental psychologist, and Pam Lewis, who is also the All Stars Talent Show Network national producer. The program is based on the understanding that in order for disadvantaged young adults to learn about and successfully pursue career options, both they and their adult career mentors need to participate in a developmental process in which they learn new ways to relate to one another.

Structured as an ensemble leadership performance in 12 weekly "acts," the multiracial group of young men and women visit the New York Stock Exchange, a national public relations firm, an advertising agency, a network television studio, a Wall Street investment company. The youth learn practical job-related skills and are each placed in a paid summer internship in a corporate setting in New York City. The Development School experience gives young people an opportunity to step into worlds other than their own and develop ongoing relationships with adult professionals.

The Development School for Youth benefits from the assistance of a support committee of volunteer business professionals, who conduct mock job interviews, lead workshops and sponsor internships. Some are now being invited to become associate program directors, to be specially trained in the developmental performatory approach and work with the program directors to lead each class.

Highlights:

- Seventeen companies, including Merrill Lynch, Citibank, Ernst & Young, International Creative Management, Donaldson Lufkin and Jenrette, provide paid summer internships for the graduates.
- In October 1998, Development School program director Dr. Lenora Fulani was a
 keynote speaker at the National Invitational Conference on Supplementary
 Education and Adults as Advocates for the Academic Development of Children, cosponsored by the Laboratory for Student Success at Temple University and the
 Task Force on Minority High Achievement of The College Board. Dr. Fulani
 spoke on how performing and creating new identities help black children learn and
 develop.
- Twenty members of the Support Committee who lead workshops, offer mock job interviews and supervise internships, attended two performance workshops designed to give them hands-on experience with The Development School's performatory/developmental approach.

Over the last 16 years, the off-off Broadway Castillo Theatre has been New York City's Community Theater. The creations of the Castillo Theatre's season of plays and musicals have grown out of its connection to the diverse communities of New York City. Castillo is a theater that grew out of a community, which is the result of decades of grassroots outreach to youth and families in inner city neighborhoods, via the All Stars Talent Show Network, and to suburban families and New York City professionals, via a volunteer fundraising and subscription drive. Ten thousand people go to the 71-seat theater each season at the Castillo Cultural Center in West SoHo.

Our Audiences

Located in one of the world's cultural capitals, New York City, Castillo's theater is designed for and attracts audiences who represent the full diversity that is New York City — from first time theatergoers to inner city youth, from avant-garde sophisticates to musical theater lovers. Castillo has developed a theatrical repertory that is distinctly New York: hip, socially relevant and highly entertaining.

Our Productions

In the last 16 years, the Castillo Theatre has produced 80 plays and musicals, many of them world premieres. A multicultural, developmental theater, the Castillo repertory features the mixing of different cultural forms and traditions to create new ways of seeing ourselves and our world. Castillo has contributed to the American musical tradition, by each season developing popular new musicals (six to date) by the composing team of Castillo's artistic director, Fred Newman and 1998 Grammy-nominated songwriter Annie Roboff. Castillo productions have also included the plays by American playwrights, Ed Bullins, Dave DeChristoper, and Laurence Holder; German avant-guard classics by Bertolt Brecht and Heiner Müller; and collaborations like the original musical play *Crown Heights* between the Theatre company and inner-city youth of the All Stars Talent Show Network, its sister project. The Castillo Theatre's productions have received press coverage in every major New York City newspaper, on NBC-TV, CBS-TV, ABC-TV, NY1, and CNN; in the American Theater Journal, The Drama Review; internationally on BBC-TV and via the Associated Press; and in every major Germany newspaper and theater publication.



Our Company

The Castillo Theatre resident company consists of over two dozen actors (veterans of the Broadway and regional theater stages as well as new performers), visual artists and set designers, lighting designers and choreographers, producers, stage managers and ushers, many of whom have work with the Theatre as volunteers for many years. In addition, each season Castillo holds auditions and casts its productions from the broad New York City community of performers.
