

Soros Agent Attacks Gen. McCaffrey's Call for U.S.-Mexican Cooperation Against Drug Cartels

Jorge Castaneda, former Mexican Foreign Minister in the 2000-2006 Vicente Fox Administration, and one of Nazi-trained George Soros's leading activists on behalf of drug legalization, lashed out against Gen. (ret.) Barry McCaffrey's recent memo urging the incoming Obama Administration forge a serious partnership with President Felipe Calderon, to jointly wage war on the drug cartels that threaten both nations' national security.

Not a good idea, Castaneda wrote in a cynical opinion piece published in the daily *Reforma* Jan. 7, warning that McCaffrey's assessment of the drug cartel threat to Mexico's national survival, "isn't necessarily true." Moreover, he adds, there could be "other motives not strictly tied to law-enforcement analysis," that are driving McCaffrey's evaluation.

Castaneda took pains to reference alleged "factual errors" and "ignorance of Mexico," he said McCaffrey displayed in his report, which the retired General wrote following a Dec. 5-7 visit to Mexico for meetings with high-level government and law-enforcement officials. Castaneda then went on to suggest that what really worries McCaffrey is the possibility that millions of Mexicans will cross the border into the U.S., in a desperate attempt to escape the drug violence, poverty and unemployment that plague Mexico.

Given Castaneda's history as a Soros lackey, and a well-known British agent-of-influence whose career has been dedicated to the destruction of the sovereign nation-state on behalf of private banking interests, his attack on McCaffrey is lawful.

As Bill Clinton's drug czar from 1995-2000, the distinguished patriot McCaffrey publicly took on George Soros by name for his drug legalization drive in the United States and elsewhere. In contrast, Castaneda used his position as Foreign Minister for Vicente Fox, to promote Soros's drug legalization agenda for Mexico, and in November of 2002, actually spent two days closeted at the Foreign Ministry with none other than Soros's top henchman Ethan Nadelmann, whose Drug Policy Alliance is one of the leading vehicles for advancing Soros's murderous agenda.

In May of 2003, Castaneda was named to the Executive Board of the Soros-financed Human Rights Watch, to honor his role in moving Mexico away from its "mistaken"

concept of sovereignty!" No wonder Castaneda tries to trivialize the deadly threat that Gen. McCaffrey so thoughtfully described in his report, and the urgent action required to confront it, by concluding his article with the inane statement, "oh, what a mess we've gotten ourselves into!"
